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### Governance Reorganization Summary

The Gardeners of Greater Cleveland's Reorganization Committee is a special committee that was appointed by President Chuck Palsa. The committee was charged with reorganizing the governance structure of the club, working within the bylaws as much as possible. By doing so, this eliminates any objections, keeps the club qualified as a 501(C)3 organization and minimizes the revision of the bylaws following the reorganization. The committee has examined the club's governance structure to make appropriate revisions such that the club is more efficiently governed and better able to achieve the club's current purpose:

"To educate its members and the public and to promote interest in horticulture pertaining to home gardening, to acquire and disseminate horticultural knowledge in regard to materials, plants and ideas in connection with home gardens to and for the benefit of individuals and communities, and to encourage and promote civic interest and pride in individuals and communities, and to encourage and promote pride in individual or private gardens, community plantings and parks."

The membership of this committee consists of Chuck Palsa, President and Chair; Bob McMahon, First Vice President; Tom Davis, Past President-GoGC and National Director-TGoA; and Larry Kell, Past President-GoGC and First Vice President-TGoA.

The Reorganization Committee has met and has reorganized the governance structure of the club that will be explained at the October club meeting. Nominations for Secretary and Treasurer will be published in the October Spade newsletter.

The annual meeting of the GoGC will be held on Monday, November 8th at which time the new Officers will be elected and installed. The reorganized governance structure of the club also will be voted on by club members at the November meeting.

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### Gardening Tips by Bob McMahon

For those of you who garden in large containers, it is possible to overwinter your perennials outside! Most of the Cleveland area is in USDA hardiness zone 6A or 6B. By selecting perennials that are at least one hardiness zone to the north (i.e. zone 5, 4, or 3), you stand an excellent chance of successfully overwintering your perennials, provided we don't have an unusually cold winter (like we did in 2014 and 2015). Most plant labels now include the hardiness zone of the perennial in question. Another factor is to minimize the "freeze-thaw" cycles that your overwintering perennials experience. This can easily be accomplished by mulching the surface of your container garden with several inches of mulch--decorative stone, bark, or even several layers of newspaper to keep the soil cold and the plants dormant until spring. Choosing containers with thick walls also helps to insulate the soil. I have several thick-walled foam containers that have worked well along with thick-walled ceramic containers. By following these steps, you should be successful in overwintering your container perennials and be rewarded by watching them emerge in the spring and grow into beautiful flowering plants every year!

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### Bob McMahon's family recipes

#### AUTHENTIC GREEK CHICKEN RECIPE FROM, MASON CITY, IA

MARINADE: Mix well together the following ingredients: 3/4 cup olive oil, 1/3 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice, 1/2 small can of tomato sauce and 3 to 5 tablespoons of dried oregano, per your taste. NOTE: If you plan to use the cooked marinade as a sauce for pouring over baked/roasted potatoes, rice, or other side dishes in addition to the cooked chicken, I recommend doubling the quantity of the marinade recipe because the cooked marinade is delicious!

PREPARING THE CHICKEN: Season two chickens (or the equivalent in parts) with pepper and garlic powder (NOTE: instead of garlic powder, I mince 2 to 3 cloves of garlic and add the minced garlic into the marinade recipe above). Pour the marinade mixture over the chicken in a baking dish and marinate for at least 1 hour (I usually marinate the chicken for 3 hours). Bake in an oven at 350° for 1.5 hours. Serve up the cooked marinade in a separate container/pitcher to pour over the chicken; the cooked marinade also is great over roasted potatoes, rice, etc.



#### MARTHA MCMAHON'S SCHAUM TORTE

In an electric mixer, beat the 6 egg whites until frothy, then very gradually add the sugar followed by the vinegar and vanilla. Continue to beat on high speed, scraping the bowl occasionally, until the mixture is quite stiff (forms peaks when the beaters are lifted out). Pour the mixture into an ungreased 9"X9" baking pan and bake at 275 degrees for an hour. The mixture will puff up and form a hard crust. Let the torte cool and then breakup the crust as necessary so it rests on the main part of the torte.

When completely cool, whip up 2 cups of heavy whipping cream (I add 1 teaspoon of vanilla and 1 teaspoon of sugar) and spread over the top of the torte. Refrigerate the torte for at least 8 hours or overnight. Serve the torte with cut-up strawberries, sliced peaches or raspberries. ENJOY!


